## I.A.S.C. Participates in Statewide Seminar

Five members of the Illinois Association of Student Councils' executive board attended a seminar on August 21 in Springfield.

Officers attending the meeting were Bill Carlson, Bill Brown, Mr. Ed Phelps, Mr. Reese Hoskin, and Mr. Gary ZumMallen. Also attending the seminar for the IASC was Sue Klyber of Elk Grove Village.

The seminar was co-sponsored by the Illinois Office of Education and the Student Advisory Committee to the state board of education, and was held in the IOE building.

The purpose of the seminar was for student organizations in the Illinois educational system to exchange ideas with professional adult associations on student involvement in government. Also the seminar was intended to help student associations to develop a working relationship with adult associations in the state.

Other organizations represented at the seminar were members of the Illinois Office of Education, the Illinois High School Association, the Illinois Principal's Association, the Illinois Association of School Boards, and the Illinois Federation of Teachers.

Each organization gave a description of what it does, the activities connected with it, and a brief history of the association.

For the IASC, Mr. Phelps, the executive secretary, gave a history of the past eight years of the IASC. Bill Carlson then continued with the presentation, telling about the activities and showing a slide show featuring some of them. He also said that in the future, he would like to see the formation of the Legislative Committee and the distribution of monthly information packets.

Ken Midkiff of the IOE said that some of the things he would like to see happen in the near future include the

increasing of the number of students on the SAC from the present seven to thirteen. Another future projection was that the student intern program of the IOE would be expanded.

Kendall Christiansen, former IASC president and presently chairperson of the SAC told the background of the SAC — how it was begun and how the members were selected.

David Murdy, a student intern of the IOE, told about the Student Government Catalog being printed and that it is to be distributed in January, one to every student council member in Illinois.

The professional organizations told how students are involved with their associations and what their policies dealing with student involvement are.

In the afternoon, the group informally discussed mutual problems and concerns of the organizations, ranging from school attendance to having students and student advisory committees on local school boards.

# Frosh-Soph Workshop Successful

The first attempt of the IASC to conduct an orientation workshop for inexperienced freshmen and sophomore council members was a big success, according to an evaluation taken after it was over. Nearly all of the delegates said they gained a lot of valuable information that would help them in the future while on student council.

Fifty-two delegates showed up for the workshop at East Bay Camp held on September 19-21. None had registered previously, so the staff had no idea of how many to expect. They were pleased with the response, after considering the short notice given schools and limited publicity for the workshop.

Friday night, the delegates met Mr. Phelps, consultant for the workshop, and the other state officers who attended the workshop.

The workshop was structured in several small groups, each with 10-14 students. The groups were imaginary student councils for imaginary schools. For practice in getting business accomplished in student council meetings, the groups were given the task of coming up with a name, mascot, and colors for their school.

At general sessions, the delegates learned about such things as basic parliamentary procedure, agendas for meetings, and the technique of brainstorming in a group.

In the council groups, they learned about the areas of authority for councils, constitutions, and also reflected on and studied in more detail what was said in general sessions.


There was also a swap-shop period when they could exchange ideas for activities their student councils at home could be doing.

Also included in the workshop was an evening of films on role playing and group dynamics. The delegates were allowed to test what they learned in group dynamics before they left the workshop Sunday. They took the NASA test, which demonstrates the old proverb, "Two heads are better than one."

Since people only remember a small percentage of what they hear, an information packet outlining most of the material covered in the workshop was given to each delegate. Included in the packet was an outline for a constitution, and a chart of motions used in a meeting and information explaining these motions.

The staff of the workshop was of the opinion that it was very worthwhile and successful. The only thing which was felt should be changed if the

workshop is continued to be held in the future is the time of the year. Many felt it was too early in the school year because many student councils were just becoming organized, or all of the representatives were not yet selected. It was suggested that it might be better to hold the workshop in October next year.



### I.A.S.C. Board Briefs

On Friday afternoon, September 12, the IASC Executive Board divided into two groups and interviewed nine applicants for secretary and six for press secretary at Prospect High School in Mount Prospect.

Saturday morning, the board began its meeting by reviewing two applicants who were selected by the interviewing committees for each position. The board then voted by secret ballot. Chosen were Brenda Harlen for secretary and Kevin Ritter for press secretary.

Other highlights of the September executive board meeting included:

- —Lynn Larson, treasurer, reported a balance of \$660.67
- -President Bill Carlson reported that the publicity brochure would

soon be in final stages. He read the brochure and the board commented on it.

- —Phil Hoyt reported that letters to schools about discussion group leaders, and resolutions and credential committee members would be mailed at the beginning of October.
- —Ed Pluhar reported the project schools which had been approved; St. Joseph-intermurals, Roanoke-Bensonmini courses, Warren-student involvement, Edwardsville-apathy, and Alton-rights and responsibilities. The board approved the five schools and their topics for projects.
- —The board reviewed and revised the 1975-76 budget Lynn Larson had prepared.
  - -It was passed that the Reporter-

Editor and his advisor would be reimbursed for all district conventions they attend, and if they can not attend one, they may designate another board member who will also be reimbursed.

—Executive secretary Ed Phelps was instructed to have 12,000 sheets of blue stationary printed with the Bicentennial logo, the IASC logo, and state officer's names and addresses.

—It was decided that resolutions committee members will come to the February board meeting at their own expense.

—Lynn Larson reported that she would put the IASC membership roster on Elk Grove's computer.

—Convention secretary Theresa Probst reported suggestions for the themes for the 1976 convention. The board voted on the themes and decided it would be "America and the IASC-A Tradition of Leadership."

—REPORTER-editor Bill Brown reported that a business manager was appointed to solicit ads for the REPORTER.

—Paul Mueller presented prices and styles of tee shirts. The board approved his request for a maximum of \$500 to begin his inventory. (See article this issue.)

—Ed Phelps reported that transportation alone by bus to Oregon for the National Conference would be \$145.00. He is still checking into the cost of lodging during the trip.

—The board discussed dividing districts because of size and decided to appoint a committee with Phil Hoyt as chairman to propose a policy defining what constitutes a district, and how funds from pre-existing districts should be divided.

—The possibility of making the Conference on Student Views a function of the legislative committee in the future was discussed. It was also discussed that topics on pending legislature could be used for discussion this year at the conference.

Suggestions were made for Linda Fuchs, chairperson of the bicentennial committee, about a possible IASC bicentennial logo, decal, or poster contest.

—The board discussed an idea to have student-principal meetings on a district or regional level.

### **District News**

#### **Eastern District**

The Eastern District executive board met on September 10 to discuss plans for the October 9 workshop and the November 13 convention.

The workshop was held at Neoga H.S. from 4:00 to 7:00 P.M., including a meal at 6:00. Consultants for the workshop were Mr. Ed Phelps, IASC Executive Secretary, and Bill Carlson, IASC President.

The convention for the Eastern District will be at Eastern Illinois University in Charleston. Candidates and discussion group leaders are still needed.

Kickapoo District

The Kickapoo District's executive board met September 23 in Champaign. Items of business discussed at the meeting were; final plans for the November 1 workshop, particulars on the convention in March, and also discussed was the possible need for district workshops between November and March.

The workshop on Saturday, November 1 is to be held at Paxton H.S. It will cover Parliamentary procedure and leadership training, and is scheduled to run from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. There will be a mock meeting to demonstrate parliamentary procedure. The duties of each officer are to be discussed, and there will be leadership training.

#### **Prairie Eight District**

During the summer, the Prairie Eight District executive board met once at Lake of the Woods, near Champaign. The main purpose at this meeting was to plan the district workshop to be held in Serena.

The Prairie Eight District workshop was held Saturday, September 20 at Serena High School. Featured speakers were Phil Hoyt, IASC first vice-president, and Fr. Robert Buday from Benet Academy. About 60 delegates from schools in the Prairie Eight District attended. Officer meetings were conducted for the officers and representatives, and discussion groups were conducted on parliamentary procedure, assemblies, fundraisers, and bicentennial projects. After the formal workshop, there was a cookout and a dance, followed by an executive board meeting.

The Prairie Eight District convention is to be held on Nov. 6 at Kankakee Community College. Plans for speakers and other details are being made. The facilities for the convention include a recreation hall, banquet room, and an auditorium for general sessions.

#### North Central District

At the convention of the Northwest District last spring, it was decided that because of problems with communication and transportation in such a large district, it would be better to split into two new districts.

Through the work of DeKalb and Sycamore high school student councils, the convention for the North Central District was planned and held on September 25, at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb.

Nearly one hundred delegates from sixteen schools attended the convention. Grant Bogle, president of the DeKalb High School student council presided over the meeting.


Bill Carlson, IASC president, spoke on the purpose of districts and how districts can plan activities to bring people together with common interests and common goals. He also touched on the functions of the IASC, what it can do for districts, and in turn, what districts can do for local councils.

A constitution originated by De-Kalb High School, and based on constitutions of other districts, was reveiwed and passed after making several changes.

In the afternoon, the Executive Secretary of the IASC Mr. Ed Phelps, gave a short talk on leadership and qualities of leaders.

Officers elected at the convention were: Treasurer, Lynn Bonaguro; Secretary, Scarlette Johnson; Vice-President, Kevin Mulvenna; and President, Peter Johnson from Sycamore High School. One of Peter's goals mentioned in his campaign speech was "To be the most active district in the state."

The meeting was then adjourned and schools met in their respective sub-district groups to elect a representative from each area to serve on the district executive board.


