# Board discusses communication

Probably the biggest problem facing student council at state and district levels is communication, and this fact was made evident when the IASC executive board discussed district information and the lack of it during its September meeting.

According to Dave Butter-field, IASC President, letters have been sent to officers in each district, but very few have responded. It was the consensus of the board that any information would be greatly appreciated.

The subject of district activities was brought up when attempting to assign board members to attend the various conventions held during the year. This was just one order of business of the September board meeting held the 11 and 12 at Serena High School in Serena, Illinois.

In attendance at the meeting were Dave Butterfield, Dave Hasan, Pat Johns, Shelly Liszewski, Tracy Enloe, Linda Platt, John Ambrosia, Burtoin Showers, George Klein, James Hindelang, Louis Nettlehorst, Penny Heiligenstein and Ed Phelps.

After calling the meeting to order Dave Butterfield reported on the Publicity Brochure, and

a motion was made and carried to print up two thousand copies instead of the original number of 1200.

Butterfield then discussed attendance at district conventions, stressing the importance of getting a list of member schools in the district along with the names and addresses of the newly elected district officers.

First Vice-President Dave Hasan gave his report next and began by passing out information which included applications for Discussion Group Leaders, Resolution Committee and Credentials Committee members.

Next he explained the point system by which the interested students are picked to serve in these positions. One point is given for each activity attended or SC office held at a school, two points for other previous leadership experience and double amount of points for any activity attended twice.

Hasan then explained that the deadlines for the applications would be the first of December. A motion was then made and carried to publish the applications in the October Reporter.

Project schools were discussed next and Pat Johns, Second Vice-President, asked for any information concerning schools that had been approved last year.

She also stated that Mr. Jerry Denoyer, Chairman of the Board, is sending her information on policy for standing committees so that she can compile a handbook.

\$555.82 was submitted as the current balance of the IASC by Treasurer Tracy Enloe. She also said the IASC books had been taken to Bloomington to be audited. Enloe then went on to the proposed budget for 1976-77

The total budgeted income was reported at \$18,399.12 and the total budgeted expenses are proposed at 17,530.00. A motion was made to accept the budget and was carried

In another report John Ambrosia, **Reporter**-Editor, passed out the September issue of the **Reporter** and explained that there was no total financial statement because the printers have yet to deliver the bill.

Ambrosia reported a total September income of \$270, and concluded his report by stating the October issue would be devoted entirely to state.

Convention themes and the 1977 IASC Convention were discussed next when Linda Platt, Convention Secretary, gave her report. After stating the correspondance she had sent so far, Platt brought up three possible themes for the convention and requested that a straw poll be taken of the state board.

The themes were "Student Council Opens Your Door to Tomorrow," "Leadership-Running an Uphill Race", and

"GRASP-Governmental Responsibilities and Student Participation."

"Leadership-Running an Uphill Race" was decided upon.

In other board action the proposed regulations and guidelines for the IASC Legislative Committee were discussed, but a motion was made to table discussion on the matter until the December Board meeting.


The board decided to make it policy that if a state officer is invited to attend a district activity and the district is unable to finance the officer's expenses, the IASC will cover expenses.

On the Liason Committee, set up to improve communications between the IASC and all districts, the guidelines for the committee were refered back to the original group which wrote them and are to be brought back to the December Board meeting.

Membership packets were discussed next, and the contents of the packets shall be the Publicity Brochure, Certificate of membership in the IASC, a Constitution, list of state functions, a letter from the IASC President and a directory of all board members. Only member schools paying their dues receive this packet.

In another board action it was directed that President Butter-field look into the cost of having a flag made for the IASC and report back in December.

The December meeting of the IASC board will be the 18-19 and is scheduled at Collinsville High School in Collinsville. The February meeting will be on the 26-27 at Morton West High School in Berwyn.

# Advisor's workshop slated

Students can no longer claim a monopoly on IASC activites as the third annual Advisor's Workshop nears. The workshop, which will be held on November 14 and 15, has been successful in its previous two years.

Last year twenty student council advisors from across Illinois gathered together at East Bay Camp in Bloomington and discussed topics including public relations, leadership training, communications with school administrators and the leadership style of advisors.

The end result of the workshop was a booklet entitled "Hints For a First Year Advisor" which was to be distributed at the 1976 Convention in Chicago.

East Bay Camp will also be the sight for this year's IASC Advisors Workshop, and besides the items discussed last year, topics dealing with constitutions, parliamentary procedure and officer's training will be added.

Many other fundamentals of student council will also be discussed at this year's workshop. Application blanks for the workshop are on the back page of the **Reporter** this issue.

# Youth foundation plans spring seminars

IN 1958 ACTOR Hugh O'Brien established an organization called the Youth Foundation, and the organization has since held yearly Leadership Seminars to help develop leadership abilities and opportunities for young people.

The Youth Foundation relies upon the high schools to select candidates for each seminar, which will be held in Chicago this April 16-23. All expenses will be paid for the student to represent the state of Illinois.

Only sophomores are eligible to be picked as the representative for Illinois. Each high school principal should have a nomination form to be filled out by the student that school selects to represent them.

Once a school has selected a representative, the completed nomination form must be mailed in. The application must be post-

marked no later than November 17, 1976. Every interested school in the state will be submitting a candidate for this honor.

Each school may nominate only one sophomore student. After the November deadline a panel of fifty men and women from across the country will review the applications and select one student to represent the state of Illinois. The winner will be notified no later than March 16, 1977.

Since all expenses are paid for this student, the selected student's school or student council will not have to take on any financial responsibilities. The student does not have to be a student council member

# Drive begins for IASC committees

THIS YEAR, The IASC has a lot of activities lined up. There are going to be workshops, conferences and conventions. Already, the Executive Board has started planning the Annual Convention.

While there are a lot of things going on this year, we still have to prepare ourselves for next year. In planning for next year we are steadily looking forward for interested and qualified people to run for state offices.

The officers of the IASC are a vital element of its operation. Without them, the association could not exist. Individual student councils would suffer from this.

**APPLICATIONS FOR** candidates will be mailed out in the following months. Anyone interested in a state office should make sure to get one of these. But just as important as the application is the applicant's background. An officer must have experience off of which he can work.

That is the purpose of this article. If anybody in your student council would like to look into a state office, he or she should get some background first. If anyone is interested in trying this out, try to attend some of the IASC functions that are listed in this issue.

I urge you to give it a try. If you get a head start on this, it will get you that much closer to the rewarding position of a State Office.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT has lost its emphasis in the past years. No longer are there riots or other causes that students can rally to. Student leaders are in there to learn for themsleves the reality and complexity of real situations, to help other people become better at what they do because they care, and even though they do not succeed every time, they try hard.

The IASC is trying to put together an educational, interesting and fun State Convention. We want to make it a good one, but we have one problem. We badly need the help and co-operation of students across the state of Illinois.

With you we can help many student councils around the state succeed. We need qualified people to serve as Discussion Group

Leaders, Credential Committee members and members in the Resilution Committee.

DISCUSSION GROUP LEADERS must organize their groups and stimulate constructive discussion and help students in their group reach conclusions on the topic being discussed. Must be the success of the convention rests on the Discussion Group Leaders who attend the convention as out of quota delegates.

Also considered out of quota are members of the Credentials Committee who have the responsibility of screening all state officer candidates before they campaign.

The members of the Resolutions Committee are to screen incoming resolutions and will have to draft a list of resolutions whick are to be given to the delegates at the convention. These students are also out of quota delegates.

Any person holding any of these positions will be requested to attend meetings before and during the convention as well as any meetings scheduled as necessary.

**IN ADDITION** it should be pointed out that an officer candidate is considered in quota and is therefore ineligible for any of these positions.

Each school may send ony one application for each position, therefore if any school decides to apply for two or three of the positions, they will want to run off copies of the enclosed forms. Each individual may hold only one position.

In order to give everyone a fair try at the positions we have an application included in this issue. All candidates must fill out this form and also include an essay detailing their reasons for wanting to be in their desired position.

Please make it as legible as possible. And be thorough as possible. Remember DO NOT forget the essay. You cannot be considered without it. Deadline for the applications is November 19th. Hurry! Act now! Good luck.

# **IASC DIGEST**

IF YOU ARE A SENIOR and have been an active school leader, you may be eligible to compete for a leadership scholarship being awarded by Century III Leaders in association with the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

The awards include \$1,000 scholarships for two winners in the state of Illinois, an all expense paid trip to Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia for the state winner, nine national runner-ups will receive \$500 scholarships in addition to state awards and one national winner will receive a \$10,000 scholarship in addition to state awards.

To enter competition for the scholarship program, funded by the Shell Oil Company, an application form must be obtained from each school's building principal. Every high school principal should have these forms along with a booklet explaining the rules in detail.

Mr. Edmund Phelps, IASC Excutive Secre-

tary, is the State Selection Committee Chairman for Illinois. Deadline for submitting the application to high school principals is October 15, though the date may be flexible.

THIS YEAR'S NASC conference will be held in Marlborough, Massachusets between June 26-30. The IASC is tentatively scheduling two buses to the conference, depending on the response of student registration from Illinois.

Early plans have the Illinois delegation leaving Chicago June 23 and stopping at Williamburg, Washington D.C. for a possible visit to the White House and a final stop in New York City to see a broadway production before arriving at Marlborough on the 26.

#### **Analysis**

### Committees set up important

Committees are an important part of any organization and the IASC is no exception. Within the outline of the constitution, three important committees are regulated.

The first of these is the Constitution Committee, which is to meet at the annual State Convention. Membership of the committee consists of all the district Presidents and other students chosen by the Executive Board.

Advisors shall also be appointed to aid the committee in accomplishing it's purpose of submitting a report of constitutional changes proposed by the committee. These shall be made available to delegates during a business meeting of the organization.

Another committee described in the constitution is the Resolutions Committee. This group shall meet twice a year to review resolutions brought up by member schools.

Membership of the committee shall be comprised of students chosen by the Executive Board, representing each district and other member schools where a district is not available.

One of the major duties of this committee is to determine whether or not resolutions brought up are controversial in nature.

If a resolution is found to be controversial, it will be referred to the Conference on Student Views. All other resolutions will be sent to the State Convention by the Resolutions Committee.


Credentials Committee is the final committee provided for in the IASC Constitution. Before any student can claim true candidacy for a state office he must first meet with and pass the review of the Credentials Committee.

The committee, composed of one student from each district and one faculty advisor from the State Board, reviews candidates on their knowledge of the IASC and its Constitution and Handbook, and examines the candidates' advisor's knowledge of the IASC and responsibilities involved with the State Board.

The limit of campaign expenses of \$25 is also regulated by this committee.

If the Committee finds a candidate to be unacceptable, a statement of disapproval and reasons must be put in a report to the assembly.

"Be sure of yourself," stresses IASC President Dave Butterfield. "and be ready to work. This is no game, and nothing to

do for the glory. There is a lot of work involved."

Dave Hasan, 1st Vice-President, who has the responsibility of establishing the Credentials and Resolutions Committees, feels, "I would strongly urge anyone who is in the least bit interested in state student council to consider running for office. It is a fun and rewarding experience."

"Be prepared," commented Pat Johns, 2nd Vice-president, who is in charge of the Project Schools and Hall of Ideas at State Convention.

"I'd say to run and do your best. It's a great experience," she concluded.

Tracy Enloe, Treasurer, stated, "You have to enjoy working with numbers and be somewhat organized."

The Treasurer's main duties are to keep a financial record of all transactions, keep an accurate membership list and prepare the budget for the year.

"Enjoy to write and be a good organizer would be some of the advice I'd give to someone wanting to run for Secretary," explained Shelly Liszewski, who holds that position.

"You'll need a little patience

and the will to sit down for hours and reqrite and organize your notes. You'll have to like what you're doing and do the best job at it that you can," She concluded.

"I think the major thing I would recommend for anyone seeking the position would be to know what she is getting him/herself into," cited Linda Platt, Convention Secretary, who is in charge of the State Convention

"He should try to get some prior experience in areas related to the office. Good examples would be serving on dance or pep committees, oir planning a sports banquet," she concluded.

The major duties of the Reporter-Editor are to publish a monthly newspaper to be sent out, and John Ambrosia, who holds that office this year stresses, "Try to be knowledgable about journalism and layout, and be prepared to give up a lot of freetime if you want to make it an effective newspaper."



# President views student councils as important

Anyone who has been President of their school student council can relate to the fact that it is not easy. But how about being President of a state student council?

"It's a lot of work, but I knew it would be," described Dave Buterfield, IASC President. "There is an awful lot of publicity that I never thought I would get."

Four years of student council involvement including being Treasurer and President of his council at Serena Community High School and holding the Vice-Presidency of the Prairie Eight District has led Butterfield to his present office.

"My main goal is to gain some valuable training in leadership, and to help myself become prepared for college and adult life," stated Butterfield describing his reasons for council involvement.

Discussing his goals for the IASC Executive Board, Butterfield related, "This year I would like to see complete unity among the Board members. We are here to serve the members, and I hope we will be

able to at all times.'

"I wanted to have the chance to be the leader of the state organization. The opportunities the position offers are best of any office," the member of FFA cited as his reasons for running for President.

Among his goals for the office this year, Butterfield hopes to keep the IASC one of the top student organizations in the state. He would also like to lessen apathy and increase communications between district and state.

"It has taken a good share of my time on the weekend," expounded Butterfield. "Also it has taken a lot of my free time on week nights."

At his home in Sheridan, Illinois, Butterfield has two brothers, John, 22 and Kent, 19, and twin sisters, Mary and Martha, age 15., He also has a golden colored Collie and a black and white tom cat for pets.

"Student government I feel has a big influence in politics and in elections years," Butterfield explained on the role of student

If eight years experience in government is something to be proud of, Dave Hasan has a lot to be proud about. The IASC First-Vice-President has been involved in student council since the fifth grade.


Hasan began in student government when he was elected president of his class in fifth grade, he was appointed to a committee to

have some importance in society. It enables students to make their feelings known on certain issues."



"I like to do almost anything. I'm attempting to play tennis," Johns said describing her hobbies. "I like to watch sports if I know somebody that's playing."


Discussing the workload brought on by the office, Johns stated, "It hasn't really affected it at all. I usually do my work during the week. If something has to be taken care of though, free time waits."
