STAND AND DELIVER

Auburn High School

Every experienced chairman has faced the challenge of trying to plan an event involving everyone within a large group. However, when push comes to shove - and that deadline is staring you right in the face - it is very tempting for you as a chairman to try to accomplish everything all by yourself. Although it may sound tempting, this leadership style alienates members of a committee and should be avoided. As a leader within a committee or council, it is imperative that you understand the two most important components of leading a large group - where to stand and how to deliver.

Before any debate, proposals, or action originates in your student council, you must know where to stand. There are three of these basic stances which you must learn to recognize and use correctly.

First of all - and most obviously - you must stand up for what is right. As a leader, you know that what is right for you may not always be right for the group. Also, you must know that what is right for the group is not always popular. By standing up for what is right for your council in the long run - not what might be easy or a quick-fix - you show your responsibility as a leader.

Secondly, you must know when to stand aside and help encourage others to lead. As a newly elected president or chairman moving towards your senior year, it is important for you to realize that you will not always be around to provide the needed leadership. It is not your duty as a mentor - but your responsibility - to be able to stand aside and nurture those students who will be assuming a leadership role in the next few years.

Lastly, you must know when not to stand up at all. This stance is for those students who tend to monopolize discussion with the "importance" or "influence" of their opinion. If, as a leader, you know that an issue is beyond your control or the control of your organization, you must not risk making a stand that will hurt either's image.

After you and your council have made your stance on an issue, the true strength of your leadership is tested in your ability to deliver. When working in a big group, the best way to deliver a product without alienating anyone is to try to involve everyone. Many times, the most willing are often the most enthusiastic about completing the task at hand. If not enough volunteers are present, however, you must know how to delegate.

If everything fails, however, and time is running out, you must be willing to put your integrity on the line. When asserting your authority as a leader, you must be conscious of moving toward accomplishing your goal, without chastising people for past mistakes. If, as a leader, you are not willing to dedicate yourself to an important cause, you cannot expect others to do so.

As a leader, people will look to you for guidance. The next time your council embarks on a major task, take a quick moment to identify where you need to stand and how you will be able to deliver the best results possible. If you are able to identify these two components, you have already started your council on the road to success.






Even though I think thank you does not express the correct acknowledgment of these people, I have a list that does need recognition:


GOOD-BYE GRADUATES,
