Earlier this summer, my Student Council advisor approached me about attending the IASC Leadership Camp at Millikin University. I eagerly jumped at the opportunity to attend because I was toying with the idea of running for a district office and I have never been one to turn down an opportunity to socialize and meet new people. Finally, July 26th rolled around and I found myself pulling up to Dolson Hall with butterflies in my stomach, not knowing what to expect of the next four days. Little did I know that the IASC Leadership Camp would exceed my expectations in every way and that I would meet so many new people and learn a lot along the way!

I knew right off the bat that the people at this camp were not your average, everyday people; these people were the leaders of their school, just like I am. I knew I would fit in just fine. As soon as I walked into registration I was greeted by warm welcomes and friendly smiles; this lasted throughout the week. The first afternoon of camp we were split into our "clubs". I was put into Club C, and being the only person from my high school, I had no clue who anyone was; within minutes that all changed. We started out by playing a few icebreakers and getting to know each other. Later that evening we had to design a Club C t-shirt and then model it for everyone. This first team building activity brought us all a lot closer and allowed people to showcase their artistic abilities, or lack of in my case. Not all team building activities went as smoothly as the first one, however. The team building exercise that got to all of us was the helicopter. If you have attended the Millikin Leadership Camp, you know exactly what activity I am talking about, and if you have not attended, which I recommend you do, you stand forewarned. We were given a helicopter kit and told to put it together in 20 minutes, but the catch is you do not have any instructions. You could only send a total of five people, one at a time, to look at a completed model for 30 seconds each. These people have to then report back to the group and tell us how to build the helicopter. By the end of this activity, some of us were getting


lippy with one another, others were pulling out their hair, and others had just give up all together; I believe I fell into all three categories.

This activity in particular taught us that when working with others you have to be patient, and being a good leader isn't always about being the one in charge, it's about learning to co-lead with others. True leaders do not bulldoze over others to get their way, they work alongside them. This was just one of the many leadership activities that really stuck with me throughout the week.

When I look back on my camp experience through the IASC, I can only think of positive things to say. The leadership activities we did really allowed me to grow as a person and made me a better Student Council member. The ideas and different activities we shared during the week were great to bring back to my own council, and I cannot wait to implement some of them. This camp really got me pumped and thinking of new ideas for my own council. I also credit the camp for giving me the final push to run for a District office my junior year. If you have not attended the IASC Leadership Camp I would highly recommend it! It is four days out of your summer and you will learn and grow as a person so much during those four days!

STUDENTS SPRING INTO LEADERSHIP

The 76th Annual IASC State Convention hosted by Oakwood High School was a great success. Approximately 87 schools and a total of 822 advisors and delegates were at the Springfield Hilton on May 6-8, 2010 as they joined OHS to “Spring into the Field of Leadership.”

After registration, everyone received a free ticket to visit the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum. At the museum, delegates could see settings of key events in Lincoln's life, including the original handwritten Gettysburg Address and a signed Emancipation Proclamation.

Once everyone was registered on Thursday, the first general session was called to order. This session featured a keynote speech by The “Original” Mike Smith. His speech entertained everyone with his catchy rhymes and life lessons. He reminded everyone to smile every day and get involved as long as it is “not illegal, immoral or fattening, and you might learn something and have a good time.” His fast-talking and fun stories kept everyone laughing and excited.

After the session, there were many discussion groups led by student leaders from across the state. Some of the topics discussed included school spirit, public speaking, school service and setting goals. The purpose of the discussions was to gain new and better ideas that delegates could bring back to their local councils. There were two other sessions of discussion groups held during the convention.

On Friday, the general session featured a motivational media program by Showtime. The program was a video on three screens that taught important lessons by using popular music and movies that are easy to relate to. The video showed the im-



portance of making smart decisions and to not be caught up in peer pressure.

During the convention, the 2010-2011 state officers were elected. The state board was installed into their offices during the formal banquet on Friday night. Following the banquet, Mike Smith led a candle lighting (glow stick) program where student leaders who excelled in leadership in their home councils were honored. This Reflections program showed everyone that we are united as leaders. Also that night, a dance with a DJ was held for all the delegates.

The last day of convention began with a t-shirt swap. Everyone could trade a shirt from their school with a shirt from another school. It was a great and fun way for schools to get new ideas for their student council t-shirts.

At the end of convention, the theme for the 2011 State Convention that will be held at the Westin Hotel in Lombard was announced. The theme is “The New Road to Leadership” and will be hosted by Carlyle High School and Convention Secretary, Sarah Schomaker.


